Sisters and Brothers of Our Parish Family,

October, Polish Heritage Month, has arrived very quickly this year. The heritage of the Polish people and the Catholic Church are inseparable. Through periods of oppression, suppression, and even martyrdom, their Faith has sustained the people of Poland for more than a thousand years of Catholic history in that great nation. No fewer than 33 saints and 77 "blesseds" have been born of the Catholic Church there during that time.

Of these, Poland has three primary patron saints. Blessed Mother under her title, "Queen of Poland," is the nation's principal patron; St. Adalbert and St. Stanislaus of Szczepanów are the other two primary patrons. St. Stanislaus Kostka and St. Andrew Bobola are the country's secondary patron saints.

Blessed Mother has been venerated as Queen of Poland since the 14th century.

Bishop Adalbert gave up his diocese (Gniezno) to become a missionary and take the Gospel to the inhabitants near Prussia. But the people opposed him when he urged them to abandon paganism. At the instigation of one of the pagan priests, the people he had gone to serve murdered him.

Following a conflict between Bishop Stanislaus and King Boleslaus, the bishop excommunicated the king. In retaliation, Boleslaus accused Stanislaus of treason and murdered him while he was celebrating Mass.

St. Stanislaus Kostka, a secondary patron of Poland, was a Jesuit novice who was an example of holiness to everyone who ever met him. After becoming suddenly ill on the vigil of the Assumption, he died on the morning of the Solemnity at the age of 17.

St. Andrew of Bobola is the other secondary patron of the nation. A Jesuit missionary, he is known for his works of mercy during a plague. Attacked by Protestants and schismatics, he was tortured, then beheaded.

May these and all the saints in heaven pray for us.

Our Invitation from the King

When people think of heaven, they often imagine a place up in the sky. Episodes of *Star Trek* should challenge that notion. The Bible usually speaks of heaven as an experience. According to our first reading, it is like a banquet, "a feast of rich food and choice wines" (Isaiah · 25:6). Such a meal is an extraordinary event for hardworking people who seldom get to enjoy such luxury. According to today's Gospel account, the kingdom of heaven is like a wedding banquet, a

feast of "calves and fattened cattle" (Matthew 22:4), a celebration of love and new life.

Some people might prefer an image that thrills the ear rather than FOR Reflection

the palette, like a Handel concerto or a Beethoven symphony. Whatever image is favored, heaven is an incomparable phenomenon that cannot be described. It is an experience that will thrill us to the core of our being.

To be invited to such an astounding experience might well be the event of a lifetime. This is, after all, an invitation from the king. Who would possibly turn it down? And yet, some do. As the Gospel recounts, some are too busy with work. Others would rather watch "the game." Still others who might accept the invitation minimize it by refusing to dress appropriately. How can people be so foolish? Yet, you and I often are.

God's invitation to the heavenly feast simply asks that we realize the magnitude of the honor extended to us, that we accept it graciously, and that we enjoy the experience.

Dear Padre,

What is the Catholic Church's position on grace versus works?

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God; it is not from works" (Ephesians 2:8–9). The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* attests that we have merit in God's sight only because "God has freely chosen to associate man with the work of his grace" (*CCC* 2008). After God acted first on his own initiative, it then follows that we're

free to act through his collaboration, "so that the merit of good works is to be attributed in the first place to the grace of God, then to the faithful" (CCC 2008). In other words, it's only through God's empowering Spirit in



each of us that makes our good works for salvation pleasing to the Lord!

Moreover, Catholics believe these good works "contribute to growth in grace, so that the righteousness that comes from God is preserved and communion with Christ is deepened. When Catholics affirm the 'meritorious' character of good works, they wish to say that...a reward in heaven is promised to these works. Their intention is to emphasize the responsibility of persons for their actions, not to contest the character of those works as gifts, or far less to deny that justification always remains the unmerited gift of grace" (*Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification*, Lutheran World Federation and the Catholic Church, 38).

Christian prayer provides us with the grace that's needed for meritorious actions (*CCC* 2010).
