

Sisters and Brothers of Our Parish Family,

Halloween is a curious holiday. While it is a time for children to celebrate by dressing up as make-believe characters and having fun trick-or-treating, some people insist that it is a pagan, or even satanic, day that should not be celebrated at all.

Whether or not Halloween is pagan in origin is a point of debate. Some people claim that it was an attempt by early Christians to "baptize" the Gaelic harvest festival in Ireland call Samhein. But recent evidence shows us that Samhein was just a simple time after harvest for the folks to celebrate before the approaching winter—with nothing pagan, satanic, or scary about it.

The fact is that Halloween has its origins in our Catholic Faith. To **hallow** is "to bless, consecrate, or make holy." The adjective form, **hallowed**, as used in the Our Father, means "holy, consecrated, sacred, or revered." As a noun, **hallow** means "saint". **Halloween** (October 31st) is a shortened form of "All Hallows' Eve," or "All Saints' Eve," which precedes All Saints' Day (November 1st).

All Saints' Day is the celebration of all the faithful who, through the power of their baptism, lived in union with Jesus throughout their earthly life and now continue that union with Him in eternal life.

Rarely, if ever, are people thinking about this when they decorate their property with ghosts, tombstones, and fake spider webs.

But, in spite of the fact that so many holidays (holy days) that are rooted in Catholicism have fallen to the secular re-making of them, there is no reason why we can't celebrate them in the way they were intended.

So, let's celebrate Halloween with all the joyfulness it embraces: the happiness of the little innocents who ring our doorbell and the inner joy that, even here and now, we are in communion with all the saints in heaven.
