THE CHURCH CELEBRATES three notable feasts this week:

St. Therese of the Child Jesus (October 1st) entered the Carmelite Monastery at age 15 and devoted her life to doing all things with love and childlike trust in God. She performed small acts of kindness always, not caring how unimportant they seemed. She once wrote, "...our Lord does not look so much on the greatness of our actions, nor even at the level of their difficulty, but at the love with which we do them."

The Holy Guardian Angels (October 2nd) are those heavenly spirits assigned to us by God to watch over us, guide us toward the good, and preserve us from evil all through our lives. Every one of us has a guardian angel. Jesus said, "...their angels in heaven see the face of my Father" (Mt. 18.10), making the existence of guardian angels a dogma of the Faith.

St. Francis of Assisi (October 4th) was born into a wealthy family and enjoyed the good life with his many friends. But a serious illness led him to a radical spiritual conversion, whereby he took the Gospel to heart, lived it as faithfully as humanly possible, and gave himself completely to Christ.





While praying before the crucifix in the chapel of San Damiano, he heard Jesus speak to him: "Francis rebuild my Church." After repairing the Chapel of Our Lady of the Angels, Francis realized that Jesus' message to him had a deeper meaning. Two years before his death at age 44, having totally conformed himself to Christ, he was blessed with the stigmata, the five painful wounds of Christ in his hands, feet, and side.

Brothers and Sisters of Our Parish Family,

This Monday will be the first day of Polish Heritage Month. Many Polish-Americans say "I am proud of my Polish heritage." But if someone asked you why, would you have a ready answer? "Hospitality" might be a good place to start. Poland is probably the only country where house guests are virtually "deified," as reflected by the saying, "Gosc w domu, Bog w domu" (a guest in the home is God in the home). In Poland, hosts typically exhibit "can't-do-enough-for-you" goscinnosc.

Moving on to another area, the valor of Polish freedom-fighters has, on several occasions, actually altered the course of European history. In the 20th century alone, the Polish armies under Marshal Jozef Pilsudski rolled back the bloody Bolshevik revolution across Europe; they impressed the Allies at Monte Cassino; and they stood up against overwhelming odds in the 1944 Warsaw Uprising. Polish fliers downed more Nazi planes per capita in the battle of Britain than the British. And, of course, steadfast Polish resistance to the Sovietimposed regime eventually gave birth to the peaceful Solidarity movement, which led to the collapse of the Iron Curtain.

Traditional Polish attachment to religion and basic family values can bring a sense of peace and stability in **today's** society that is experiencing so much turbulence. Many of the time-honored traditions, especially those of the holidays and holy days, with the celebrations and foods unique to the occasions, serve to strengthen the familial bond.

The slogan, "For your freedom and ours," has long expressed Polish solidarity with the underdog. Medieval Poland became a refuge for Jews and Protestants fleeing persecution in the West. Kosciuszko bequeathed his American estate for the liberation and education of black slaves; unfortunately, slave-owning Thomas Jefferson failed to carry out that bequest.

These are just a few things worth thinking about during Polish Heritage Month. Polish-Americans must never forget that they are descendents of a great nation whose contributions have made a positive imprint on mankind. Be proud of your roots, and share your heritage with family, friends, and the community at large.
